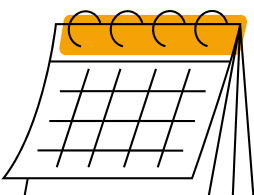

Tulip Tree (*Liriodendron tulipifera*)

The Indiana state tree! Tulip tree, also known as tulip poplar, is a fast growing tree, achieving a height of 80' with a width of 50'. Adaptable to different soil types but needs good drainage. Yellow blooms in late spring. Yellow fall color.

Wildlife: Early nectar for pollinators and good cover and nesting for birds



American Sycamore (*Platanus occidentalis*)

Fast growing native tree that prefers growing near water bodies.

It is one of the tallest native deciduous tree, able to achieve a height of 100'! Remarkable white peeling bark sets it apart in the natural landscape.

Wildlife: Provides cover and shelter to cavity nesting birds and its fruit balls provide a winter food source. It is also a caterpillar host, supporting dozens of species which are critical protein sources for nesting songbirds

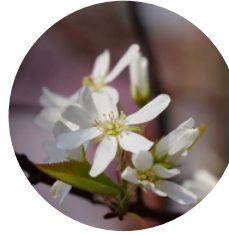


Red Maple (*Acer rubrum*)

Tree that ranges 40-70' tall by 40-60' wide.

Prefers moist soil (irrigated or low ground). Fall color can vary from gold to reds and oranges.

Wildlife: Waterfowl, turkey, and songbird habitat. It is a larval host for over fifteen moth species



Allegheny Serviceberry (*Amelanchier laevis*)

Large shrub that grows 20-26' tall and has 15-20' spread. Good in many soil types and is moderately drought tolerant. Beautiful fall color. Produces attractive flowers and berries. Grows best in full sun to part shade.

Wildlife: Pollinator and bird magnet. Host of Tiger Swallowtail, Viceroy, and 110 other butterflies & moths



'Low Scape' Black Chokeberry (*Aronia melanocarpa*)

Small shrub that's 2-3' tall with 2-3' spread. Tolerates a range of soil conditions. Prefers low moist well-drained site. Produces attractive fruit. Full sun.

Wildlife: Plants are browsed by deer and rabbit. Fruits are eaten by song and game birds. Host of Coral Hairstreak butterfly.



Witchhazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*)

Small shrubby tree 20-30' tall and spread of 15-20'. Prefers rich moist soils. Requires regular watering when being established. Growth rate is moderate. Partial shade is preferable.

Wildlife: Yellow flowers are attractive to pollinators. Game birds and squirrels eat seeds. Song birds will nest in branches. Host to Spring Azure and 67 other species.



White Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*)

Tree that's 70-85' tall. Trunk diameter can reach 4'. Slow growth. One of the most adaptable oaks that tolerates a wide range of soil types.

Wildlife: Acorns eaten by a wide range of animals. Host of 436 butterflies and moths.



'Blue Muffin' Arrowwood Viburnum (*Viburnum dentatum*)

Large shrub that is very useful for border and screening, growing 7-8' tall x 7-8' wide. Prefers moist rich clay and loam soils but grows in a variety of drainage ranges. Produces attractive flowers and berries. Tolerates shade.

Wildlife: Fruits are eaten by many species of song birds and mammals.



Canadian hemlock (*Tsuga canadensis*)

Evergreen conifer prized for its beautiful weeping loose form, perfect as a specimen or screen. Thrives in full sun but tolerates partial shade and needs well-drained soil. Hemlocks will reach 30-40' high in northern Indiana. Wildlife: Can provide habitat for nesting birds and winter bird shelter.



American Arborvitae (*Thuja occidentalis*)

40-60' Evergreen tree with similar spread. Prefers well-drained, loamy soil (loam, loamy clay, sandy loam) and full sun to partial shade. Excellent screen and windbreak. Wildlife: Attracts deer, songbirds, upland birds & game
